

At the turn of the century San Francisco built a fair to replicate the more famous Chicago worlds fair. The exposition featured many bizarre sideshows and amusements. This amazing ride from the 1896 fair is the first example of an electric powered 'spook house' and appears to be heavily influenced by the 17th century etchings of John Fluxman. Little is known about either the designer of the ride or the nature of the experience that it delivered.

In 1914 the silent film Cabiria was the first to feature a moving camera, the changing point of view helped to show off the monumental set design. Highly influential, the movie was an interpretation of a classic literary work by Gabriele D'Annunzio. After conjuring up the images in this nationalistic fairytale the Italian poet became heavily involved in facist politics, leading a coup to occupy the city of Rijeka.
